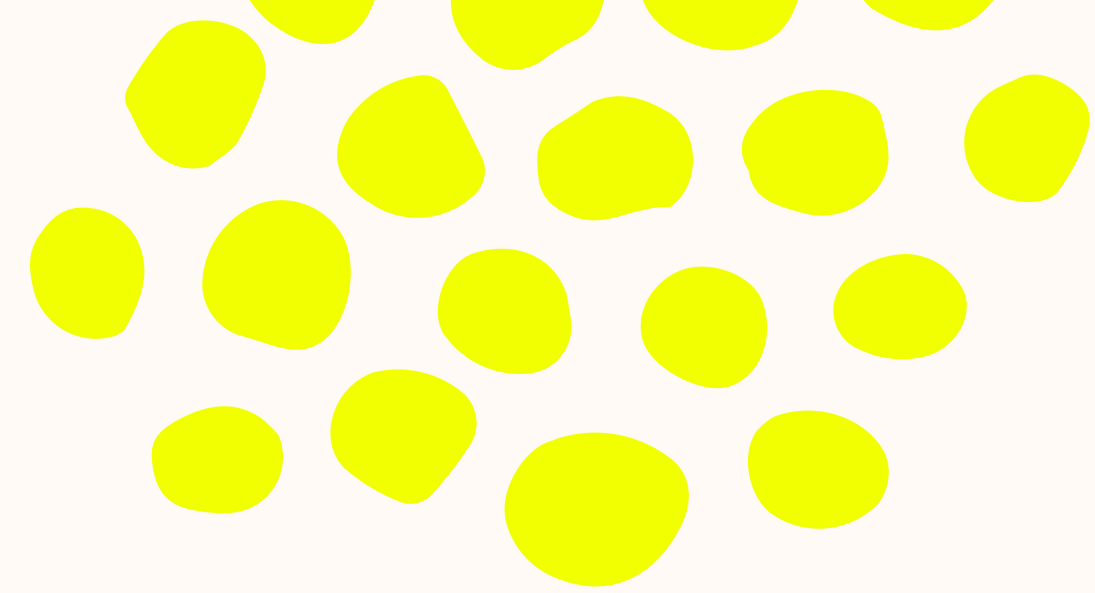


Early Life and Education
