


THE REIGN OF RAIN QUEEN MODJADJI

• Queen Modjadji II dies, and is succeeded by her daughter, Masalanabo Modjadji.

1875

 Masalanabo Modjadji dies, and is succeeded by her sister, Mokope Modjadji.

1895

Mokope Modjadji dies, and is succeeded by her niece, Khetoane Modjadji.

1896

known as Mujaji.

1897

Queen Modjadji III (Mujaji) is officially crowned as the Rain Queen.

1905

The British colonial government recognizes Queen Modjadji III as a queen, and grants her a stipend and a formal title.

1959

Queen Modjadji III dies, and is succeeded by her daughter, Makoma Modjadji.

• Khetoane Modjadji dies, and is succeeded by her sister, the famous Queen Modjadji III, also

1980

• Makoma Modjadji dies, and is succeeded by her daughter, Mokope Modjadji II

2001

• Mokope Modjadji II dies, and is succeeded by her daughter, Makobo Modjadji.

2005

• Queen Makobo Modjadji dies unexpectedly at the age of 27, leading to controversy over the succession of the Rain Queen title.

2006

• A new Rain Queen, Masalanabo Modjadji III, is installed after a lengthy dispute over the succession.

2016

• Queen Masalanabo Modjadji III dies, and is succeeded by her daughter, Masalanabo Modjadji IV, who is the current Rain Queen




